Sophisticated, Smart, and Selectively Lethal



- ▶ **1. ADVANCED SENSORS:** Modern mines are equipped with sophisticated acoustic, magnetic, and pressure sensors, allowing them to discriminate between specific targets.



- ▶ **2. PROGRAMMABLE LOGIC:** They can be programmed to activate after a specific number of ships pass, target certain vessel types, or detonate at precise times.



- ▶ **3. STEALTH TECHNOLOGY:** Designed for low observability, many modern mines are difficult to detect by conventional mine-hunting techniques, blending into the seabed.



- ▶ **4. DEEPWATER CAPABILITIES:** Unlike older models, contemporary mines can be deployed in deep waters, extending their reach and complicating clearance operations.



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THE STRAIT OF HORMUZ: A CRITICAL CHOKEPOINT

20% of Global Oil Supply at Risk



► **1. ENERGY LIFELINE:** Over 20% of the world's total petroleum liquids consumption, and a significant portion of global LNG, transits the Strait of Hormuz daily.



► **2. NARROW PASSAGE:** At its narrowest, the Strait is only 21 nautical miles wide, with shipping lanes just two miles wide in each direction, making it highly vulnerable.

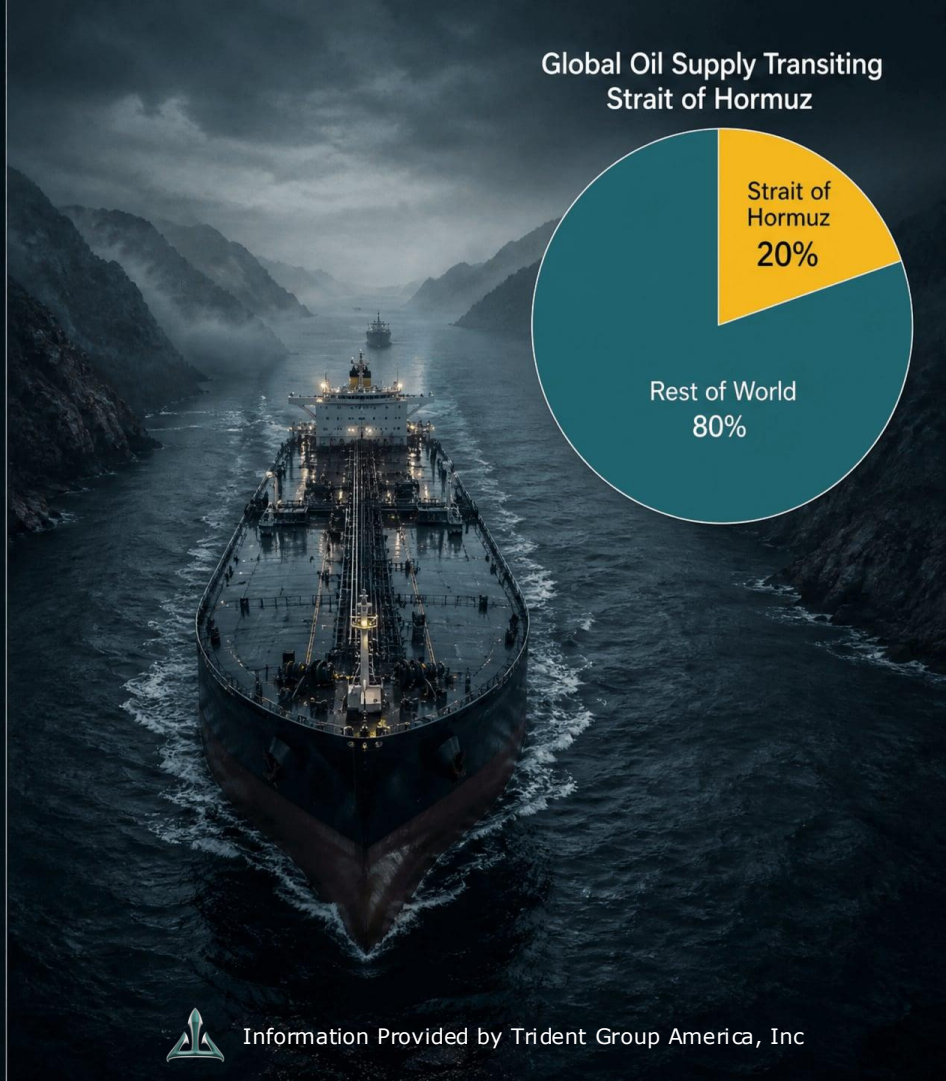


► **3. IRANIAN LEVERAGE:** Iran views the Strait as a strategic asset, capable of disrupting global energy markets and exerting geopolitical pressure through mining threats.



► **4. ECONOMIC VULNERABILITY:** Any significant disruption can trigger global oil price spikes, impacting economies and increasing the cost of goods worldwide.

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MINE WARFARE: A COSTLY DETERRENT

The Disproportionate Expense of Mine Countermeasures



1. SLOW AND DANGEROUS:

Mine clearance operations are inherently slow, dangerous, and resource-intensive, requiring specialized vessels, drones, and highly trained personnel.
